## **Human Trafficking Questions:**

#### "Total Attitude" Toward Human Trafficking

Directions: Please answer the following questions using the scale ranging from 1 (meaning not at all) to 7 (meaning very much so).

- 1. Human trafficking is a global issue, but to what extent do you think there are significant numbers of trafficked women in the United States?
- 2. More generally, to what extent do you think the problem of human trafficking involves the United States?
- 3. Human trafficking is a problem—but just one of many global problems. To what extent do you think the government should make it a priority to devote resources to trying to reduce human trafficking?

#### Houston-Kolnik et al. (2016) "Victim's Control" and "Individual's Control"\*

Directions: Please answer the following questions using the scale 1 meaning strongly disagree and 7 strongly agree.

- 1. A trafficked person has the ability to leave their circumstances.
- 2. A trafficked person could go to the police, but chooses not to.
- 3. If a trafficked person chooses to leave, the problem would be over.
- 4. I can make a difference for trafficked persons.
- 5. I have the ability to work against trafficking through political involvement.
- 6. I am able to raise public awareness about trafficking.
